## Moving Forward with Expansion Plans Where We Stand Today

### The Architect

Over the summer, the Architect Selection Committee reviewed some very exciting building proposals. Ultimately, San Francisco based EHDD Architecture, Esherick Homsey Dodge & Davis, was selected as the firm to design the building expansion. Founded in 1946 by renowned Bay Area architect Joseph Esherick, EHDD today is a national leader in architecture, design and sustainability with particular expertise in libraries, educational facilities, and museums.

### Project Management

Conversion Management Associates Inc. (CMA), the project management firm for the Library's building project in 1997, will again manage the expansion planning and construction. Belvedere resident Glenn Isaacson, a founding principal with CMA, was personally very involved in the '97 project, and has already been tremendously helpful in working on contracts, time lines, cost analysis, etc.

### A Capital Campaign

Of course we will need to raise funds in order to pay for our expansion. We have therefore recently hired a Capital Campaign Manager, Anne-Marie Bonfilio (see Page 8). A Capital Campaign Steering Committee (CCSC), previously established by the Belvedere-Tiburon Library Foundation (BTLF), will work with Anne-Marie and Library Director Deborah Mazzolini on structuring the Campaign. At their October 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting, the BTLF voted its unanimous support for the fund raising drive.

### Town Support

The land behind the Library has been donated by the Town of Tiburon to the Belvedere-Tiburon Library Agency (BTLA) for the expansion, and the project is supported in the Town of Tiburon's General Plan. Additionally, the Town of Tiburon Planning Commission and Tiburon Town Council have voted to streamline the permit review process for the Library.

### Public Meetings

It is the Belvedere-Tiburon Library Agency's mandate and EHDD's goal to give the community the opportunity for input throughout every phase of the project. The first Public Meetings with EHDD Architecture presenting and discussing options on the conceptual design will be held:

Monday, Nov. 12, 7pm at Tiburon Town Hall

Tuesday, Nov. 13, 7pm at Belvedere  
Community Room

The Library will sponsor several other open public meetings as part of the process. Notices will be posted at The Ark Newspaper, on flyers, and on the Library's website. The Library now offers help from real, live tutors right from home or at the Library via the Internet!

Live Homework Help is available for 4<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade and college introduction level students seven days a week, from 3:00 pm to 10:00 pm (Sunday through Thursday, 3:00 pm to 7:00 pm for Spanish tutors). This program connects students to a real live tutor from home or while visiting the Library using either PCs or Macs.

Children and young adults simply log on to the Library's Web Site at [thelibrary.info](http://thelibrary.info), click on the Live Homework Help link from the Reference Center tab, enter the grade level and the subject help is needed in, and within a few minutes or less you are connected to an expert tutor. Help is available in math, science, social studies and English.

## Resources for the College Bound

Fall is the time of year when college-bound high school students, especially juniors and seniors, get serious about visiting, selecting, and applying for entrance to a college or university. The Library offers a large number of excellent resources to help students and their parents make it through this demanding time. In addition to the list of books and print guides listed below, the Library's reference staff has compiled an online resource guide of web sites pointing to the best Internet sites on the topic of higher education. The College and Career Reference Areas in the Library are located near the Teen Librarian's desk. Along with comprehensive college materials are up-to-date exam study guides for tests required for college applications. A helpful brochure detailing many of these college resources, both in print and online, is available here and at the Reference Desk. Here are some of the materials we have on hand:

- **Colleges That Change Lives: 40 Schools That Will Change the Way You Think About Colleges**, by Loren Pope, 2006. Highlights schools that emphasize collaborative learning and which select students with a wide range of abilities.
- **Barron's Best Buys in College Education: Profiles of More than 245 Colleges**, by Lucia Solórzano, 2006. Schools that Barron's editors feel provide an excellent education at a lower cost.
- **The Fiske Guide to Getting Into the Right College**, by Edward B. Fiske, 2007. An overview of the college admission process from selection criteria to financing.
- **The Insiders' Guide to the Colleges**, compiled and edited by the Yale Daily News, 2008. Presents a view of colleges from the perspective of students.
- **They Teach That in College? A Resource Guide to More Than 75 Interesting College Majors and Programs**, by College & Career Press, 2006. Provides information about interesting, cutting-edge college majors unknown to many counselors and parents.

The black and white copiers can make multiple copies, saving you time and frustration. We have two machines so you should never have to wait to make a copy of anything.

## Hot Flicks



At the end of October, the Library launched a new collection of DVDs called Hot Flicks. Hot Flicks are recent high-demand feature film DVDs that circulate for 3 days, with no holds or renewals. New titles will be added every week. You can find the collection in the new book area in the central section of the Library. Hot Flicks may be returned at any Marin library. The request charge will continue to be fifty cents.

## Support Our Book Sales

The Library has begun holding a monthly sale of used books donated by generous members of the community. Keep an eye on our calendar for the next one! Our first sales were held in August and September and collectively raised over \$500 for our new materials budget. We hope to do even better in coming months, although our lack of storage space (donated books are currently stacked in the cubicle of Reference Librarian Abbot Chambers) limits the number of items we can have ready for sale.

If you can't wait for the next monthly sale, we also have two carts and a spinning rack of sale items in the entry area near the Circulation Desk. Hardbacks are \$2, large paperbacks \$1.50 and small paperbacks \$0.50. Frequently we will also have DVDs, videos, CDs, and audio books for sale (see article below).

## Donate Used Books and DVDs

If you have books to donate to the Library, we are able to accept up to 3 bags or boxes of materials, provided they are in good condition, are not musty or dusty, and are not out of date (e.g. magazines, old computer manuals or text books.) We can provide you with a receipt for a tax deduction for your donation. We can also help if you have a larger collection of books in need of a home!

If you own DVDs that you no longer watch, why not donate them to the Library so others get a chance to enjoy them? Hollywood, independent, documentary, TV show, and children's DVDs, in good condition with their cases intact, all make welcome donations. If we're unable to add a donation to the collection, we will sell it on our sale cart to raise money for the Library. Donations are tax deductible; just ask for a gift receipt.
